SAND POINT COUNTRY CLUB – GUEST INFORMATION

DRESS CODES

COUNTRY CLUB ATTIRE, MAIN DINING ROOM

Country Club attire is permitted throughout the Club and is required in the Main Dining Room.

Permitted:

- Tasteful and tailored slacks, khakis, skirts, or denim
- Collared shirts for men and boys
- Dress sandals for women and girls
- Jackets are encouraged but not required
- Tasteful and tailored shorts with finished hems

Not Permitted:

• All forms of leisurewear, athletic attire, athletic shorts, caps, and visors

CASCADE GRILL ATTIRE

Attire appropriate to the Cascade Grill may be worn while in the Grill dining spaces and at the pool level.

Permitted:

- Neat, clean golf, athletic, and tennis attire
- Tasteful shorts, skirts, or denim
- Neat, clean collared or collarless shirts
- Sandals and clean, soft spiked, golf shoes
- Forward facing caps and visors
- Children's sports jerseys

Not Permitted:

- Bare midriffs
- Swimsuits without a cover-up (only permitted on the pool level)
- Sports cleats
- Bare feet

CASUAL ATTIRE

Casual attire is permitted throughout the Club with the exception of the Main Dining Room.

Permitted:

- Neat, clean golf, athletic and tennis attire
- Tasteful and tailored shorts, skirts, or denim
- Neat, clean collared or collarless shirts
- Sandals and clean, soft spiked golf shoes
- Forward facing caps and visors

Not Permitted:

- Untailored sweatpants or sweat suits
- Tank tops, halter tops, and bare midriffs
- Swimsuits without a cover-up
- Youth team sports uniforms and sports cleats

GOLF COURSE ATTIRE

All attire for both men and women will be clean and in keeping with country club and golf standards. Golf attire may be worn throughout the Clubhouse.

Permitted:

- Soft spikes
- Shirts must be worn at all times; men must wear their shirts tucked in
- Sleeveless tops for women must have a collar
- Tasteful and tailored shorts and skirts with finished hems
- Forward facing caps and visors

Not Permitted:

- Metal spikes
- Denim of any kind, cutoffs, or pants with unfinished hems
- Men's tee shirts or tank tops
- Sport jerseys
- Undergarment, halter, or strapless tops and bare midriffs
- Tennis, jogging, gym, or track shorts, warmups or sweat suits
- Leggings or sport tights, except when worn under a golf skirt

SWIMMING ATTIRE

Proper swim attire is required while using the pool. Swimwear should be tasteful and appropriate for a family club. Thong swimwear and uncovered underwear are not permitted, cutoffs and other sportswear not made for swimming are not to be worn in the pool. Children who are not toilet trained must be dressed in tight, well-fitting rubber or plastic pants. Disposable swim diapers are not allowed in either swimming pool. Swimming attire is not allowed in any of the Clubhouse dining facilities other than the Snack Bar. Cover-ups and footwear must be worn to and from the upstairs locker rooms and anywhere outside of the pool level.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES AND POLICIES

CELL PHONES

Cell phones must be in "silent" or "vibrate" mode while on Club property. Texting and emailing are allowed in allareas of the Club but should be conducted in a way that does not impact other members' club experience. Discretionand decorum are the overriding principles. Members are responsible for ensuring their guests adhere to the policy outlined below.

Golf Course, Pro Shop, Practice Areas, and Driving Range:

• Cell phone conversations are not permitted, except for a personal or medical emergency or contacting the Golf Shop to report an incident on the course or to request assistance relative to course play.

Clubhouse, Swimming Pool, and Tennis Courts:

- Cell phone conversations are not permitted in the Fitness Room, Locker Rooms or on the upper floor of the Club, which includes the Main Dining Room, Pan Room, and upper-level decks. If a call is to be made or taken while on the upper floor/deck of the clubhouse, please utilize the phone room in the upper hall.
- Cell phone conversations are allowed in all other areas of the Clubhouse as well as on the swimming pool deck and tennis court viewing areas.

It is expected that members and guests will only make or take important calls and complete them quickly. The caller must be considerate of others, move away from the group, and speak in soft tones. Long conversations or loud conversations are not permitted as they have the potential to disturb others in proximity.

PERSONAL ALCOHOL

Consumption of personal alcoholic beverages is prohibited during the hours bar service is available. Wine may be brought to a member dining function and is subject to a corkage fee.

GOLF CLUBS

Golf clubs are not permitted inside the Clubhouse. Areas for dropping and transporting clubs from parking lots and entries are provided in outside areas.

PARKING

Guests may park in designated areas only. The Lower-Level Parking Lot is restricted to members only. Guests may utilize the loading area by the pool, but any parking and waiting should be done in the Upper-Level Parking Lot or along Lakemont Drive. Areas reserved for Club operations, deliveries, handicapped, etc. are clearly posted and members and guests may not park in those areas. Cars improperly parked will be impounded.

SMOKING

Smoking is prohibited within the Clubhouse and within 25ft of doors, windows, and air intake units. Dispose of smoking material properly.

GOLF RULES AND POLICIES

PACE OF PLAY POLICY

SPCC's pace of play for a golf foursome (4) should be less than four (4) hours and three (3) minutes. Irrespective of the size of your group, it is always your group's responsibility to keep up with the group in front of you. If your group is unable to keep up with the group ahead and there is a group waiting behind you, it is necessary to invite that group to play through. It is then your responsibility to maintain pace with that group. It is not reasonable for any group to expect to play through the field if there are no gaps ahead. Furthermore, it is not reasonable for any group that falls out of position not to invite the group behind to play through.

LOSS OF OR DAMAGE BY ERRANT GOLF BALLS TO PROPERTY OF OTHERS

A member shall be responsible for all damage or injury to property of another (including the Club), caused by or resulting from a golf ball hit by the member, any of his family members or guests. Property of others shall include property belonging to an owner of any residential property adjacent to or in close proximity to the Club's golf course and to an owner of any vehicle or mobile equipment in or about any of the parking areas or roadways within, adjacent to or in close proximity to the Club's golf course. For purposes of this provision, the responsibility of the member shall be without regard to whether the owner of any such residence property or owner of any such vehicle is a member of the Club. When a member hits an errant golf ball and becomes aware that it has or may have caused damage or injury as stated in this paragraph, it shall be such member's duty to promptly contact and notify the owner of the property of the damage or injury, identify such member or guest as the individual responsible and reasonably compensate the owner for its loss, including the cost of repair or replacement.

Nothing in this paragraph shall be interpreted or construed as a Club policy or House Rule with regard to the matter of personal injury or death caused by an errant golf ball, it being the Club's intention that such an occurrence, the loss or damages there

from and any responsibility with respect thereto shall be a civil matter as between the persons involved and shall be determined or resolved in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington.

GOLF COURSE ETIQUETTE

Bunkers – Leave it the way you found it! - Always enter and exit a bunker from the low side. This minimizes damage to our steep bunker faces. Before leaving a bunker, players should use a rake to smooth over and fill up all footprints and holes made by them and any nearby made by others. When finished, the head of the rake should be placed in the bottom of the bunker with the end of the handle resting on the bunker edge. After you rake the bunker, imagine your ball there and ask yourself if you would be happy with the lie?

<u>Greens – Love your greens!</u> - Players should not lean on their clubs when on the putting green, particularly when removing the ball from the hole. This can leave a depression on the putting surface. Never let the flagstick drop heavily onto the green surface. Set it down easily, to avoid potential indentations. Repair your ball mark and any other you see on the greens. Never remove the ball from the cup using the head of your putter. This can damage the edge of the hole and spoil it for others.

<u>Tees – Love your greens!</u> - Replace your divot or fill it with the sand and seed mixture. This includes practice swing divots. Pick up your tee following your shot. Broken tees can be discarded into the broken tee caddies located offto the side of the tee markers. Keep from taking your pull cart across the teeing surface.

CONTROL BY GOLF PROFESSIONAL

Play on the course is under the control and supervision of the Head Golf Professional and his assistants. Throughout the year, hours of play may be adjusted by the Golf Professional and Golf Course Superintendent in response to weather, course conditions, tournaments, or other events that significantly impact the golf course or conditions for play. All members and guests shall comply with the requests and suggestions of the Golf Professional and his assistants for speeding and facilitating play on the course.

Foursomes

The standard number of players in a group shall be four (4), except that the Golf Professional or assistants have the discretion to allow larger or smaller groups.

Metal Spike Prohibition

Metal spikes are prohibited at SPCC.

SPEED/PUSH CARTS

The majority of the player walk; to help encourage walking SPCC offer pushcarts for use. When using pushcarts, it is important to use them properly. Do not push them across tees or greens and do not push them between the greens and greenside bunkers. When around the green, get used to pushing the cart toward the next tee, while taking the clubs needed for short game play.

Push Carts/Joevs

- Keep pushcarts/joeys off the aprons and greens, and do not push them between greenside bunkers and green
- Keep pushcarts/joeys off the teeing grounds

Electric Carts

- Keep them to the path on all par 3s
- Never drive them closer than 30 yards to the green
- Follow the cart signage on the holes that indicate when to exit the fairway

CHILDREN ON THE COURSE

Children under the age of 10 are permitted to play golf on the course only if accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult. Exceptions to this rule may be made at the discretion of the Golf Professional. Parents should schedule play at such times that it will not interfere with regular play. Check with the Pro Shop for suitable times.

A non-golfing child may accompany a parent or other adult on the course. The safety and conduct of the child is the sole responsibility of the supervising adult. The golf course is not to be used as a "playground," rather as a place for children to learn about the game. All Club rules and policies regarding speed of play, etiquette, dress, and use of golf carts must be followed.

CELL PHONE USE ON COURSE

Cell phone conversations are not permitted in the following areas: Golf Course, Pro Shop, Practice Areas, and Driving Range, except in the case of a personal or medical emergency or contacting the Golf Shop to report an incident on the course or to request assistance relative to course play.
